Monash BreastScreen is the largest service in Victoria approx. 60, 0000 women per year are screened across our 7 screening sites. We are the Training Centre for all BreastScreen Radiographers across Victoria

Breast Surgery Unit is the largest Service in Victoria

Our service is a multidisciplinary integrated service that works collaboratively with other services across Monash Health to provide screening, diagnostic, surgery, radiation, chemotherapy, oncology, shared care and research

Our team includes Surgeons, Radiologists, Radiographers, Nurse Counsellors, Breast Care Nurses, Metastatic Nurse Practitioner, Social Work, Patient Navigator, Research, Data and Administration


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THE REALITY-

Incidence of Breast Cancer in Australia



1 in 7 women in Victoria will develop breast cancer in their lifetime.



This year

19,807 women and 167 men will be diagnosed

55 - on average will be diagnosed everyday



And it's growING

Due to our aging population, early detection, the Breast Screen program and lifestyle factors.



Women now have 90.8% chance of surviving at least 5 years after diagnosis





90% of Victorian women with breast cancer live.




Collar bone down to the bra line

Breast Health Understanding

- Whatever your age, size or shape, it's important to take care of your body and your breasts.
- Having good breast health understanding means getting to know how your breasts look and feel

Do I need a breast screen?

Aged 50-74?

You should be screened every two years.

In your 40s or over 75?

Talk to your doctor to find out if breast screening is right for you.

Under 40?

Breast screens are not effective for women under 40 years.



What happens at BreastScreen?

Before screening

At screening

After screening

Two years later







Talk to your family about your **family history** of breast & ovarian cancer

Complete your registration form online or in paper form

Wear a top with trousers or a skirt

See your doctor **first** if you have breast symptoms

Our female staff will explain what will happen.

You will be asked to remove your top in private. Ask us if you would like a **gown**.

The machine will press firmly but should not hurt.

You can ask for the breast screen to stop at any time.

Your results will be sent to you in 2-4 weeks.

We will contact you if more tests are needed.

Most women who are called back for more tests **don't have** breast cancer.

Most women are asked to return in 2 years' time.

See your doctor if you notice any **symptoms** between breast screens.

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Reasons for compression

To reduce the radiation dose absorbed by the breast tissue (thinner tissue).

To reduce the chance of movement (blurry images)

To obtain better detail and definition by spreading out the normal tissues (making Cancers easier to identify)



Frequently asked questions

Does it matter what size my breasts are?

No it does not, it is more about your anatomical and body presentation, such as frozen shoulders, prominent ribs, depressed sternum and physical limitations to get you into the right position to see the whole breast away from your body

The last mammogram I had was very painful and I am worried about coming again

The way we need to position the breast and apply the pressure to smooth the tissue out is usually uncomfortable, but should not be painful. You should let the radiographer know if this is what you are experiencing and you can stop at anytime.

What if I feel a lump or notice a change in my breast?

BreastScreen is not for you. You need to see your health provider and they will arrange a diagnostic mammogram and ultrasound –you get results the same or next day. BreastScreen results are 2-4 weeks

How long does it take?

It takes approximately 10 minutes

Is it done by a female?

All BreastScreen mammograms are performed by specially trained breast imaging radiographers and are all female




